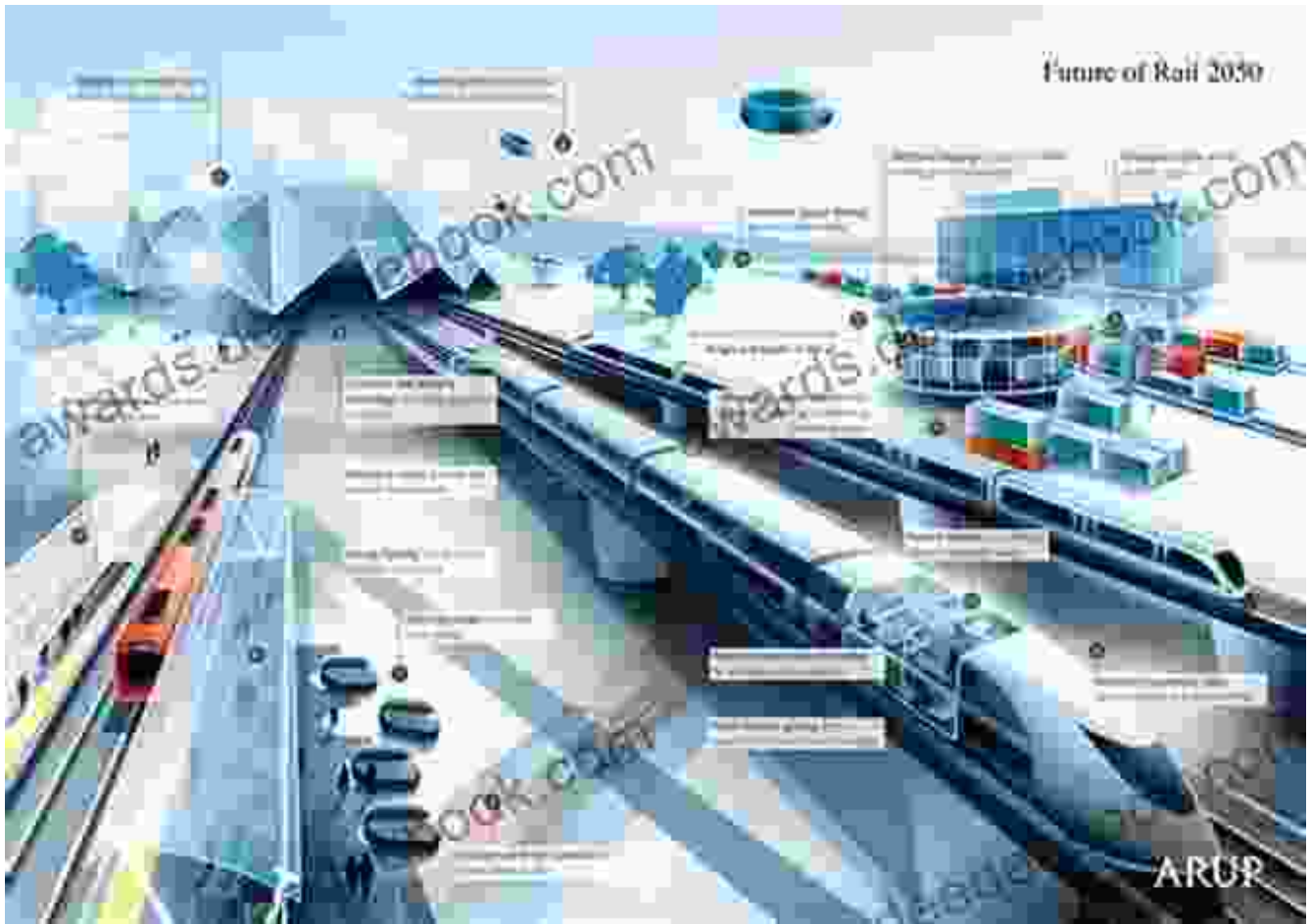
Education Reform

- Characteristics: Two-way communication, some feedback loop, and some decision-making.

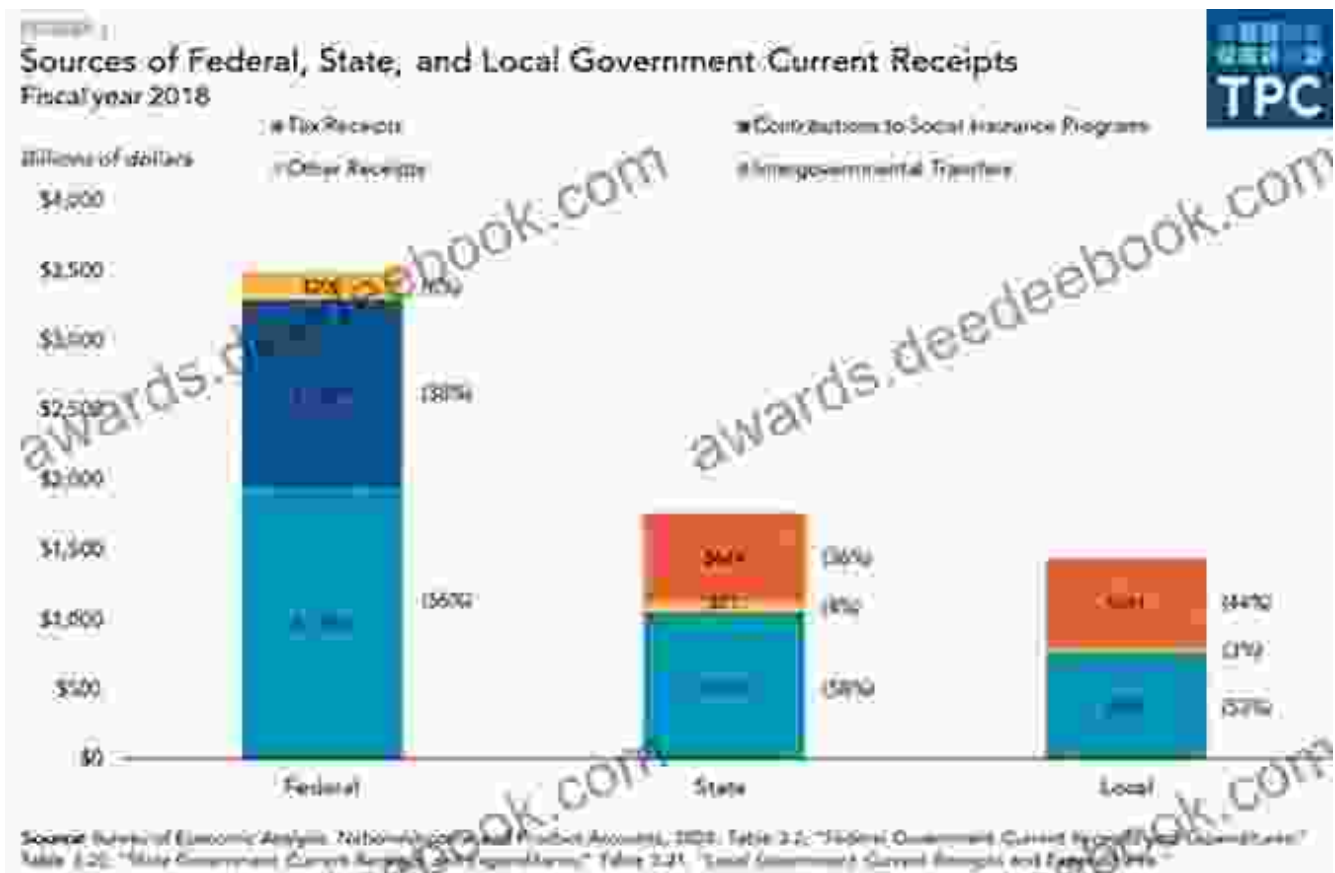


DECISION-MAKING PARTICIPATION
