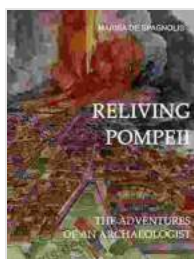


# Reliving Pompeii: The Adventures of an Archaeologist in Archeologia

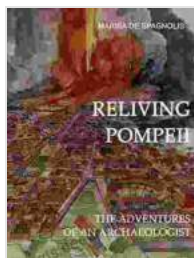
