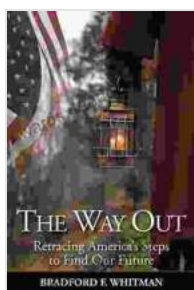


Retracing America's Steps To Find Our Future

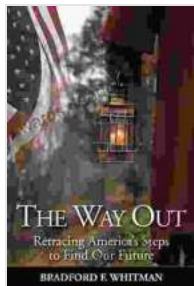
